 of what people have asked about. Would like to see a place or document where
 residents can go to see "who else cares about what I care about".

 - In support of Justice Park property and appreciates that it is in the CIP (in the planning phase). Recommended looking into plantings that would mitigate storm water.
 - In regards to the City of Milwaukie potentially separating from the district, would like to make sure that negative impacts are kept down, and the great things that the parks department is working on don't get pushed aside.
- Lindsay Freedman (Resident of Subarea 3)
 - Excited to see Justice Park on this list and to get more movement. Wanted to plant
 a seed to see what type of commitment we can get while we're in the planning
 phase and what can we do to keep moving the ball forward.
- Stephanie Tolonen (Resident of Subarea 3)
 - Expressed excitement for the possibility of Justice Park coming to fruition.
- Thelma Haggenmiller
 - Would like there to be a parking lot with items, like Adopt-a-Park, to get monthly reports on what staff is doing with these kinds of things.

 - o Milwaukie Community Center serves the entire District.
 - The Community Center Advisory Board (CCAB) is recruiting for one additional member.
 - The CCAB is investigating new ways to get information out the public, not only through MCC, but for the District at large. Please share the programming with your subareas.
- Anatta Blackmarr (Subarea 2 Representative)
 - Love the equity based idea for the needs assessment. Want to be looking at standards for what we should be aspiring to in the District (how many parks for a certain area, how much green space is, etc.).
 - The parking lot could be more like a bulletin board where people could come and go, and post their thoughts.
 - Wanted to mention a neglected park in Subarea 2. Bunnell Park/Bunnell Property has a picnic table, garbage can and lawn.
 - At the last Concord Task Force meeting a lot was fleshed out about the park. The architects and landscape architect are continuing to

focus on bringing the park into the library, with a lot of views of greenery from the windows. A splash pad is being considered. The green space between the library and community center is being envisioned to as a "story garden pocket park". There were benches throughout the park, a multi-purpose open area, a history walk in front of the school building, picnic groves, and a trail around the property.

Dear North Clackamas Parks District Advisory Committee Members,

Our family lives across the street from the Concord School, and we have been following the plans to make changes to the property.

Like many people in this neighborhood, we participate in the <u>Backyard Habitat Program</u>, run by the Portland Audubon Society and the Columbia River Land Trust. The north fork of Boardman Creek passes under Harold Ave and emerges in a steep ravine on the east border of our property, then continues through our yard uncovered. Together with our next-door neighbors, we are restoring this streamside to provide wildlife habitat and protect the watershed. Over the years, we have worked with the North Clackamas Watersheds Council, Oak Lodge Water Services, and Clackamas Soil and Water Conservation District to tackle the invasive weeds and increase the biodiversity of this special place.

In just a few years, we have seen owls and bats return to the area, and hummingbirds and pollinators are beginning to flourish, an antidote to the on-going global collapse of bird and insect populations. We hope the Concord School project will involve landscaping with most or all native plants (including trees), controlling the invasive weeds that starting to take over some areas, avoiding pesticides, and designating some "natural" areas to be left undisturbed by human visitors. This would extend the wildlife corridor across the street, while creating a Nature Sanctuary for the public to enjoy. Not only have green spaces in urban areas been shown to boost the happiness of residents, this type of approach can also help us do our part to combat climate change.

We do also love our Oak Lodge library. My son and I visit it at least once a week. They are wonderful and we want them to be happy. It would be nice if the library and community center could be developed such that the footprint of the paved areas is kept the size it currently is, or perhaps shrunk. Perhaps the library could have a satellite location at the Concord location and maintain its main building in its current location. Or perhaps some of the concrete around the Concord School could be rewilded, to compensate for the footprint of a new building on the property. Perhaps you could consider a smaller parking lot and ensure

that the Community Center is easily accessible by public transportation

Thank you for considering our perspective in your deliberations. Please feel free to reach out as things develop if you would like to collaborate on improving the ecological and climate value our neighborhood.
