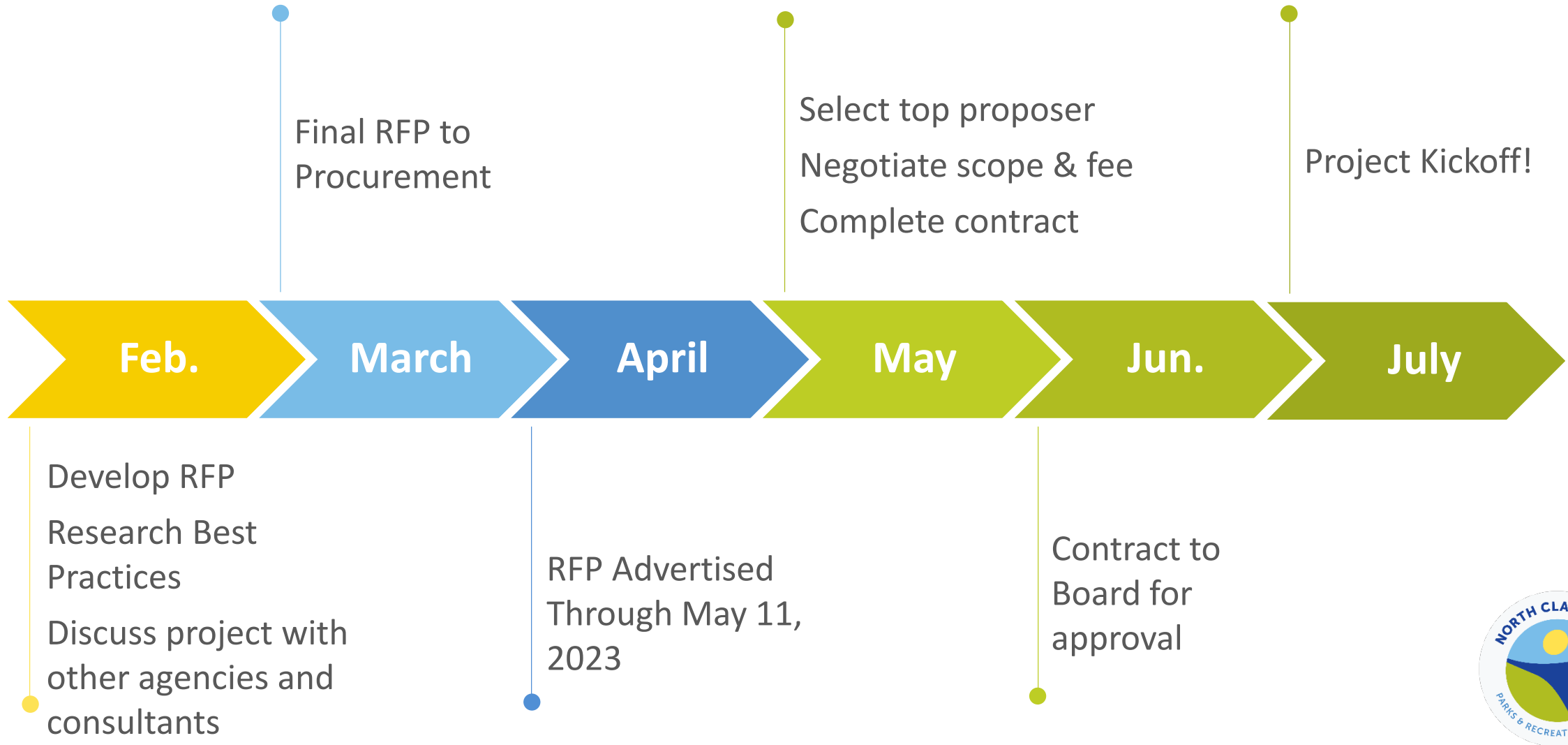

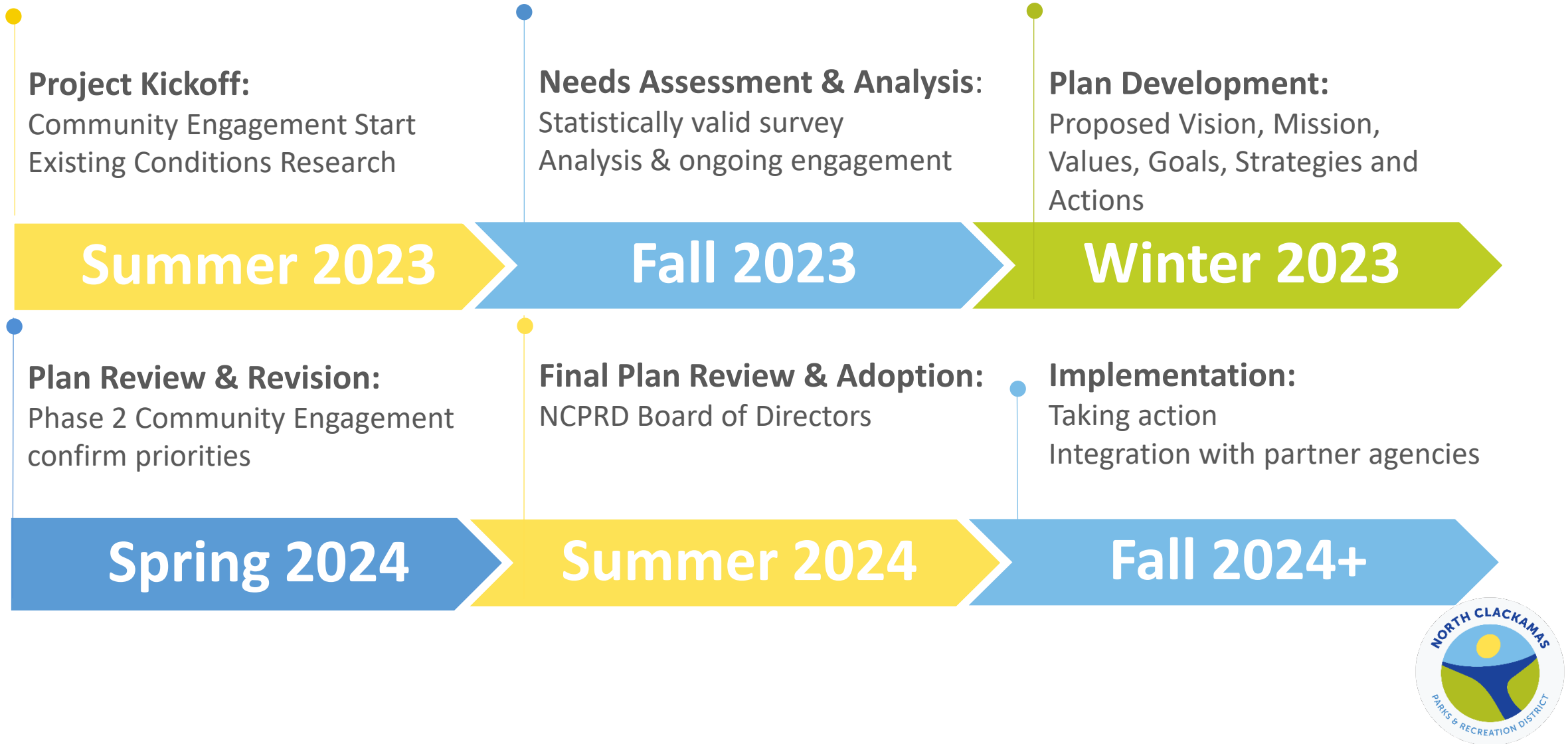
NCPRD FY '22/23 Capital Budget: \$500,000 maximum

Asset Development

The purpose of the Asset Development program is to coordinate and manage current and long-range planning, the acquisition of park land, all aspects of the District's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), and the repair and replacement of capital assets in order to provide recreation facilities that serve District residents. *(Capital repair and replace will be included in Division Report for Parks, Trails and Natural Areas).*

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- **System Plan:** NCPRD worked with County Procurement to finalize and post the Request for Proposals to attract submittals for System Plan work. Proposals are due May 11.
- **Play area at Concord Property:** NCPRD submitted an application to Local Government Grant Program for the play area at the Concord property.

CURRENT PROJECTS/TASKS

- **Community Park at Concord Property:** Coordinate with the project team on playground design; plan public engagement in April to review park and playground design. Saturday April 15 at 1-3 p.m. is a community gathering and design update at the Concord property. Virtual presentation is Wednesday, April 19 at 6:30 – 7:30 p.m. More info at: <https://ncprd.com/concord-property-project>
- **Jennings Lodge Elementary:** Work with consultant and County Procurement to negotiate the final contract for engagement, planning, and design; work with Oregon City School District and NCPRD Board of Directors to update the 2020 intergovernmental agreement to support work ahead.
- **Strategy and Polling Work:** Plan for public focus groups and statistically significant polling to understand potential options for changes to governance and funding in the future.
- **Trolley Trail Safety Audit:** Prepare for audit with initial research.

LOOKING AHEAD

- **Metro Local Share Funding:** Prepare spring application to Metro to request park and playground elements at the Concord Property as NCPRD's first local share project.
- **System Plan:** Prepare for consultant selection in May 2023.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

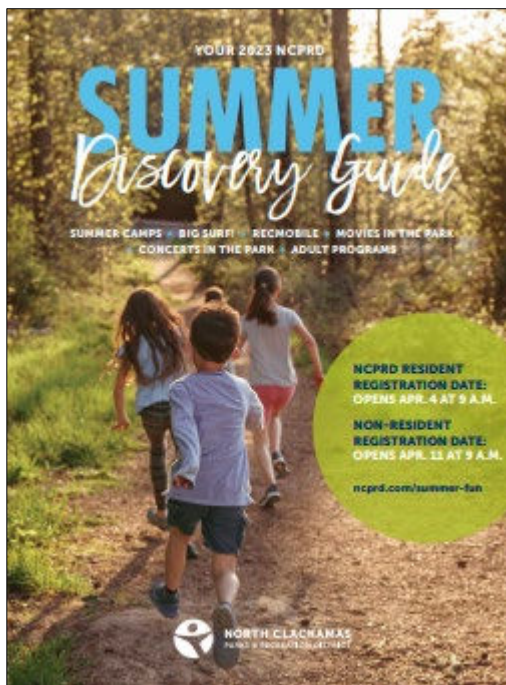
- **Instagram Milestone:** The NCPRD Instagram account (@ncprd) just exceeded 2,000 followers!
- **Aquatic Park Spring Break Promotion:** Launched a digital campaign to drive attendance for Big Surf recreation swim at North Clackamas Aquatic Park over Spring Break. The campaign consisted of Google AdWords, paid social media posts and a giveaway contest with PDX Parent. The campaign received over 75,000 impressions and 5,800 actions/clicks, resulting in a 148% increase in website. Attendance results are still being analyzed.
- **Outside Insider e-Newsletter:** The e-newsletter, promoting upcoming programs and events, was distributed to 8,865 subscribers on March 30.
- **Concord Engagement:** To promote the upcoming engagement opportunities on April 15 and 19, NCPRD launched an outreach campaign, including a mailer to 2,000+ homes surrounding the Concord Property, digital, fliers, handouts, signage and a media release.
- **Summer Program Promotion:** Began promotion for summer registration and one of NCPRD's busiest seasons. Promotion will continue until the end of registration and includes:
 - **Discovery Guide Brochure:** 5,000 inserted into the Clackamas Review, 3,300+ mailed to residents, and 1,000 distributed at NCPRD facilities and libraries.
 - **Digital:** Mix of Google AdWords, e-blast, digital fliers, web content, and social media.
 - **Signage:** A-frames placed at NCPRD facilities.
 - **Advertising:** Digital listings and print ads in PDX Parent and NW Kids

PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON

- **Pollinator Garden:** Developing interpretive signage and education materials for NCPRD's three new pollinator gardens.
- **Concord School Property Display Case:** Utilizing the empty display case at the Concord School Property entrance to share information on the building's history and future projects.
- **Program Materials:** Development of print and digital promotional materials for movies, concerts, and other special events.

- **Awareness campaign:** NCPRD will be developing concepts for an awareness campaign, designed to increase engagement across all departments.

Older Adult Services

The purpose of the Older Adult Services program is to provide coordinated nutritional, transportation, educational and social service programming to the communities' older adults and persons with disabilities; assisting them in remaining independent and helping them thrive in their later years.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- The Milwaukie Community Center (MCC) Foundation hosted a Housing and Senior Services Fair on March 9. The event featured over 50 different vendors, attracting over 200 visitors who came to discuss a wide range of topics. Vendors paid for booth space, successfully generating over \$6,000 for the Foundation.



- March for Meals, the Nutrition Program's annual fundraiser concluded at the end of March. While the final numbers are not yet available, over \$10,000 in donations have already been raised. The transition from collection jars to QR codes has successfully increased opportunities for the public to donate. Fundraising and community support are critical for the Nutrition Program since the federal reimbursement per meal of \$4.60 only covers slightly more than half of the cost of producing each meal.

PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON

- As of April 1, garden beds in the Community Gardens at the MCC became available to rent for the low cost of \$20 per year. This allows community members, who may not have a gardening opportunity where they live, the chance to grow flowers and vegetables for their personal use. The garden beds were designed with varying heights to ensure accessibility to limited-mobility users and to accommodate all levels of physical abilities.
- This year's Volunteer Recognition is being held at the MCC on Saturday, April 15 at 10 a.m. In addition to a morning of praise and appreciation from staff, attendees will enjoy a traditional brunch and entertainment. The MCC's volunteer program is robust, with over 400 volunteers filling various roles from drivers to dishwashers, receptionists to librarians, attorneys to nurses, data entry workers to wood splitters and retail workers. The volunteers enable the MCC to offer an abundance of much needed services and programs to the community.

LOOKING AHEAD

- The Milwaukie Community Center welcomed a new employee, Diane Cone, to our social services team in April. Diane's addition marks the first time in almost a year that the social services team has been fully staffed. She will be responsible for various duties, including running the weekly respite program, conducting in-home assessments for the Meals on Wheels program, providing support for the in-house foot clinic and legal clinic, and helping clients with information and referrals to services that will enable them to maintain their independence as they age.

Parks, Trails and Natural Areas

The purpose of the Parks, Trails and Natural Areas program is to provide management, maintenance and ongoing stewardship services to NCPRD residents and visitors so they can access safe, clean and well maintained parks, trails and natural areas both now and into the future.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Planting:

- Planted 2,850 bareroot plants across Hull Swanson, Robert Kronberg Nature Park, Hawthorne Park, Stringfield Family Park, Risley Park, Alma Myra Park, and Boardman Wetlands Nature Park.
- Planted 1,590 container plants across 142nd Trail, Trillium Creek Park, Boardman Wetlands Nature Park, Spring Park, Stringfield Family Park, Hawthorne Park, Alma Myra Park, and Robert Kronberg Nature Park.
- Spread 15 lbs. of native wildflower seed at Boardman Wetlands Nature Park.

Pollinator Gardens:

- Finished planting and mulching pollinator garden beds.
- Met to plan interpretative signs.
- Planning for Pollinator Week events at Stringfield Family Park at the end of June.
- **March 4:** Watershed Wide event with Johnson Creek Watershed Council at Luther Rd Property.
 - 40 volunteers, for 156 volunteer hours, made and installed over 100 live willow stakes, seeded 20 lbs. of native grass and wildflower seed, picked up 450 lbs. of garbage from the site, Bureau of Environmental Services gave a site tour.
- **March 25:** Mulch Madness at Alma Myra Park.
 - 8 volunteers, for 23 hours volunteer hours, spread 17 yards of mulch around the Doug Fir trees and some of the new plantings at Alma Myra Park.
- Planted 1,450 bareroot shrubs across Alma Myra Park, Rivervilla Park, Stringfield Family Park, Hawthorne Park, Hull and Swanson, and Trillium Creek Park.
- Planted 275 container plants at Alma Myra Park: ferns, trillium, and fringe cup.
- Planted 530 container plants at the pollinator garden at Stringfield Family Park and 80 at Hawthorne Park.
- Made and installed 400 live stakes of native willow, dogwood, and spirea species at Boardman Wetlands Nature Park.

PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON

- Oak Grove Boat Ramp gate has been repaired after damaged occurred due to a motor vehicle on February 24.
- Working on completing conditional use ZDO required updates for Concord.
- Repairing flooring and restroom fixtures in upstairs Concord restroom after abatement work.
- Installed a new bench on the Trolley Trail at Hull St and Abernathy Ln. This was installed as a measure to prevent vehicles from parking along the trail in the area.
- Blinds installed in Concord offices.
- Vandalism at Rivervilla Park that occurred March 25 has been repainted and cleaned up. A police report was filed.
- Purchased a Greenworks 60' electric mower. NCPRD now employs two electric mowers.

Recreation

The purpose of the NCPRD Recreation program is to provide a variety of recreational and educational opportunities directly and in partnership with other providers to enhance personal health and the quality of life for all residents of the District.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Winter recreation programming concluded in March with strong participation numbers. Our youth and preschool dance classes were particularly popular, with 42 students enrolled and 50 students on waitlists for the five classes we offered. Additionally, we had 450 participants registered for 26 fitness classes and three fitness workshops. The Sit N Fit class was especially successful, with 29 participants per class. Our horseback lesson partnership with Highland Stables continues to be well-liked filling with the maximum number of participants registered.



- The Mindful Way to Better Fitness workshop guided 19 registrants on the Alexander technique which engages the mind and body in a more relaxed way that can lead to relieving back pain, reducing tension and helping build resilience.
- The preschool sing-a-long class had 45 participants through the eight-week period that enjoyed live music to sing and dance to. Shakers, drums and other simple instruments were provided to get their groove on.



- Mad Science Rocket Camp was held during spring break, March 27-31. Eleven kids learned how to build and launch rockets and the physics of rocket flight.



- The Adaptive and Inclusive Spring Social was held on March 24 with 29 participants in attendance. The event was filled with activities such as picture bingo, prizes, snacks, crafts, music, and socializing. Participants had a wonderful time and are grateful for the accessible programming within our district that is tailored to meet the needs of individuals of all abilities.



- Cheer Starz Dance and Cheer ended their season on March 18 with a short performance and dancing at the Shooting Stars end-of-season celebration. Both programs joined together to celebrate the end of their very fun seasons by dancing together to popular songs such as the Cha Cha Slide and YMCA.
- Spring Fever League began on March 26 at Nelson Sports Complex. Nineteen teams will play in the 8-week season that will conclude with end-of-season playoffs. This is the first Sunday only Spring Fever League.
- Hoopers basketball season ended on March 19. The league had 165 teams comprised of nearly 1,600 players. The league relies on the time, dedication and effort of 255 volunteer coaches.



- Shooting Stars, a basketball program for players with cognitive disabilities, saw its largest number of participants since it came to NCPRD in 2019, with a total of 30 players. The season concluded with a special celebration following their final game. Before the game, players had their names called as they ran through a tunnel and the national anthem was played. The Cheer Starz performed at halftime and awards were distributed after the game.



- Open Gym volleyball for adults continues to grow in popularity. The program runs on Sundays in the Concord School Property gym from 3-5 p.m.
- North Clackamas Aquatic Park completed another successful session of swim lessons and, with the help of newly trained staff, proudly expanded current offerings with the introduction of nine additional classes. Several positive comments were received from parents who expressed their appreciation for our staff's dedication and commitment to providing quality swim lessons.
- Parent Preschool swim has been increasingly successful, with an average of 60 participants on the weekdays and 100 on the weekends.
- The Aquatic Park had two full facility rentals. Hosted by their PTO, Holy Family Catholic School had approximately 300 participants and Mt Scott Elementary School had close to 400.
- Ready, Set, Go of Clackamas and Multnomah County, a preschool readiness/parent education program, visited the Aquatic Park for a Parent Preschool swim.
- Aquatic staff recently hosted some well attended and sizable sessions – an annual recertification clinic for the Oregon White Water Club and winter roll sessions for Oregon Kayak and Canoe Club.



PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON

- Summer classes and offerings including 42 summer camp options have been finalized. Summer registration began on April 4 for residents and April 11 for non-residents.
- In preparation for summer, staff will be posting for job opportunities for programs such as Aquatics, RecMobile, Movies in the Park and summer camps.
- Preparations have begun for Summer Nights League adult softball program that will run from June-August.
- Staff readied a new sports program that was introduced to the public in April: Indoor Pickleball on Saturdays and Wednesdays at Concord School Property. Play features four, two-hour periods serving 20 participants each. All equipment is provided, but players may bring their own paddles or balls.
- Staff prepared the North Clackamas Park ball fields and complex for opening in April. Chris Cakes NW will be the site's contracted concessionaire.
- Planning for the inaugural Adaptive and Inclusive Spring Prom, scheduled for Saturday, June 3, is underway. The program staff has successfully recruited seven program volunteers, and many sponsors have generously donated products and funds to support the event's decorations,

prizes, and refreshments. DJ, Shawn Hinz, will be providing music for the dance! A big thank you to Shawn and his family for donating their time and talent to help make this event a success.

- Sponsorship package has been finalized for Movies in the Park. Staff will begin soliciting local businesses for support.
- The Aquatic Park hosted another successful, free American Red Cross Lifeguard course over spring break and is currently in the process of interviews to continue the expansion the lifeguard team.
