Goal 1: The NCPRD has an inspiring and clear systems plan that serves as the gold standard for the region and reflects:

1. Parks are primary neighborhood gathering spaces that are welcoming, safe, and accessible for all.
 - Every child can walk safely to a park.
 - The District leads with inclusive policies, practices, facilities, and programming that evolve with the community, including all ages, races, abilities, identities, income levels, and cultures.
 - There are plentiful year-round outdoor and indoor opportunities to learn and play at District facilities and events.
 - Parks and facilities offer safe space and resources for community members in need.
2. Parks reflect and contribute to the economic health of the District
 - Informed and involved communities provide abundant funding and resources to the District.
 - Businesses and nonprofits participate in robust public/private partnerships with the District.
 - Individuals and groups prioritize donating land, buildings, money, resources, and time to the District.
3. Parks support climate resiliency
 - Native, climate-resilient vegetation supports native habitats and effectively serves as a carbon sink for the District.

Goal 2: The NCPRD is an independent service district represented by a resident board.

Asset Development

The purpose of the Asset Development program is to coordinate and manage current and long-range planning, the acquisition of park land, all aspects of the District's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), and the repair and replacement of capital assets in order to provide recreation facilities that serve District residents.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- **Park and Play Area at Concord Property:** NCPRD held two successful events to review the park and playground design and engage with residents – Saturday April 15 community gathering and design update at Concord and a virtual presentation Wednesday, April 19 (see community engagement enclosed). The presentation is at <https://ncprd.com/concord-property-project>.

CURRENT PROJECTS/TASKS

- **Community Park at Concord Property:** Completed 50% construction drawings for park and site; submitted conditional use permit application; completing play area concept.
- **Jennings Lodge Elementary:** Work with consultant and County Procurement to negotiate the final contract for engagement, planning, and design; work with Oregon City School District and NCPRD Board to update the 2020 intergovernmental agreement to support work ahead.
- **Strategy and Polling Work:** Complete statistically significant polling of 400 District residents to understand potential options for changes to governance and funding in the future.
- **Trolley Trail Safety Audit:** Kick off meeting with consultant and review background research. Continue initial planning for safety audit.
- **Metro Local Share Funding:** Prepare spring application to Metro to request Concord park and playground elements as NCPRD's first local share project.

LOOKING AHEAD

- **System Plan:** Responses to Request for Proposals due May 11, with selection and contracting to follow.
- **Project Timeline Outlook:** Quarterly update enclosed.

Community Engagement Summary

In the final phase of the park design, NCPRD was looking to reengage the community and share exciting details on park features and amenities. A mix of print and digital promotional materials, in both English and Spanish, were developed to increase awareness around the project and invite residents to two presentations with public input opportunities.

An in-person community event was held on Saturday, April 15, 2023 at the former Concord Elementary School building. The event included a live presentation, kids activities, project display booths, and opportunities to engage with staff, ask questions and provide comments. The following week, on April 19, 2023 a virtual presentation was held, with time afterward for questions and completing an online questionnaire. Both events were well attended and the majority of feedback on the project has been very positive.

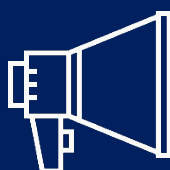

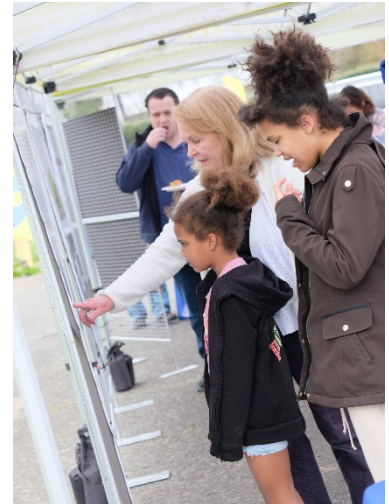

Marketing and Communications

The purpose of the NCPRD Marketing and Communications program is to increase engagement and awareness around NCPRD's diverse spectrum of programs, activities, and projects, while ensuring clear and consistent brand messaging and design.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- **Concord Engagement:** Wrapped up an outreach campaign and two engagement opportunities, on April 15 and 19, for the new park design at Concord Property.
- **Program Promotion:** Continued promotion of summer programs and camps. Also created materials and increased awareness around an Earth Day volunteer event at North Clackamas Park, which had 26 volunteers.

PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON

- **Pollinator Gardens:** Developing interpretive signage and education materials for NCPRD's three new pollinator gardens. A Pollination Celebration event will be held on Saturday, June 24 from 1-3 p.m. and will feature educational booths, kid's activities, face painting and ice cream.
- **Concord School Property Display Case:** Utilizing the empty display case at the Concord School Property entrance to share information on the building's history and future projects.
- **Program Materials:** Development of print and digital promotional materials for movies, concerts, RecMobile, OBT2, Celebrate Pride Drag Bingo and more.

LOOKING AHEAD

- **Awareness Campaign:** NCPRD will be developing concepts for an awareness campaign, designed to increase engagement across all departments.
- **Trolley Trail Brochure:** The Trolley Trail brochure will be getting a refresh, with additional copies printed for distribution.

Older Adult Services

The purpose of the Older Adult Services program is to provide coordinated nutritional, transportation, educational and social service programming to the communities' older adults and persons with disabilities; assisting them in remaining independent and helping them thrive in their later years.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Over 200 volunteers and guests attended the annual Volunteer Appreciation event held on April 15 at the Milwaukie Community Center (MCC). In addition to a delicious brunch prepared by the Center's very own nutrition staff, volunteers each received a gift and enjoyed live music. Staff served at the event in an effort to show their sincere gratitude for the amazing volunteers and their dedication, support, and hard work.
- The Center's community garden boxes received a major makeover thanks to aspiring Eagle Scout Luke Sandness. Not only did Luke raise funds and gather donated materials for the project, but he mobilized volunteers to help with the needed labor. Luke, along with family and friends, spent several afternoons refreshing the Center's community garden boxes by power washing, removing moss, replacing boards and amending the soil.
- On April 8, volunteer Brian Wilson from Providence Milwaukie Rehabilitation Services organized and led a work group to split and stack firewood for the MCC Emergency Firewood Program. The program helps low income seniors have high quality firewood to help heat their homes during the winter season and relies almost entirely on volunteers and donated firewood.

PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON

- Fiscal Year 23-24 support requests to the MCC Foundation were formally made at the Foundation's April Board Meeting. An overwhelmingly generous total of \$41,000 was approved. These funds will support the Center's transportation, social service programs, the nutrition program including under 60 Meals on Wheels and professional therapists for A Place at the Center. Funds will also extend towards NCPRD special event sponsorships, a mural for the Center and replacement of broken tables.

LOOKING AHEAD

- **May 6:** The Milwaukie Community Center Foundation is hosting the 35th Annual Wine and Roses Italian Dinner (formally Spaghetti Dinner) with two seating times: 5:00 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. An over-three-decades-long tradition at the Center, this fundraiser, which is a Portland Rose Festival Community Partner Event, is a fantastic opportunity to support the MCC while enjoying an Italian dinner with friends along with added excitement in the form of Italian raffle items. Cost is \$25 and tickets can be purchased online at <https://milwaukieccfoundation.org/> or in-person at the Center.
- **July 1:** The Great American BBQ at the Milwaukie Community Center (South Lawn) from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Fee: \$12. Choose indoor seating (by reservation) or take your meal to go. Pre-purchase tickets in the MCC gift shop before June 24. Vegetarian options available. All proceeds benefit the Nutrition Program and Meals on Wheels.

Parks, Trails and Natural Areas

The purpose of the Parks, Trails and Natural Areas program is to provide management, maintenance and ongoing stewardship services to NCPRD residents and visitors so they can access safe, clean and well maintained parks, trails and natural areas both now and into the future.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Planted Shore Pines at Boardman Wetlands Nature Park.
- **April 22, 2023:** North Clackamas Park, 26 volunteers attended, pulled ivy and 100 small hawthorn trees, Native Plant Society gave wildflower walk.

PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON

- Turning on irrigation.
- All drinking fountains are on.
- All sites have been mowed at least once.
- Parks are busy.
- Hiring seasonal employees.
- Working on completing conditional use ZDO required updates for Concord.
- Painted, installed restroom fixtures in upstairs Concord restroom after abatement work.
- **Pollinator Gardens:** Planning for Pollinator Week events at Stringfield Family Park at the end of June.

LOOKING AHEAD

- Currently recruiting for a Park Maintenance Specialist, Building Maintenance Assistant position.
- Recruiting seasonal groundskeeper positions.

Recreation

The purpose of the NCPRD Recreation program is to provide a variety of recreational and educational opportunities directly and in partnership with other providers to enhance personal health and the quality of life for all residents of the District.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Spring recreation classes kicked off in April with 695 participants across 52 adult and youth programs (27 fitness, 12 art/dance and 13 general interest). Spring swim lessons began with 382 participants including four additional classes that were added to accommodate waitlists.
- Summer registration began on April 4 for residents and on April 11 for non-residents. The majority of our 19 summer camp offerings are full with waitlists.
- Cheer Starz Dance and Cheer League has 50 participants this spring! Coaches choreographed and demonstrated their team's dance and cheer routines at the 2nd pre-season coaches' clinic.
- Pickleball at Concord School Property on Wednesday evenings and Saturday mornings continues to grow in popularity. Learn more at ncprd.com/pickleball.



- The North Clackamas Park ballfields opened on April 1 and are in full swing. Staff worked extremely hard to prepare the fields for opening by battling against the unusually wet and cold weather.
- On April 8, our two Kid's Container Gardening classes hosted 20 children ages 4-10. Participants planted six container gardens while learning about plant and seed anatomy through song, art and other engaging activities.



- To celebrate aloha and the giving of a lei, 26 participants attended the May Day Lei Day workshop on April 16. Students made two different leis to be given on May 1 (May Day) or for graduation gifts.



- Youth flag football began on April 23 with 120 participants attending a fundamentals practice. Games start for most divisions on May 7. NCPRD's flag football program is a league for boys and girls grades, grades K-6th.
- Portland Area Senior Softball (PASS), for ages 62+, returns to North Clackamas Park ballfields on April 24. The senior teams play on Monday and Wednesday mornings through August. PASS is one of the largest and most diversified senior softball leagues in the Northwest.
- The Spring Fever 19 team adult softball league is underway and will conclude play on May 21.
- The Aquatic Park hosted 34 students for the annual Oregon Recreation & Parks Association (ORPA) Lifeguard Leadership workshop which teaches head lifeguards, aquatics coordinators and pool managers proper water chemistry, safe aquatic facility practices, programming tips, effective scanning and gives students the opportunity to practice their skills in the water. Two of our very own aquatic staff members attended the workshop and stated that fellow participants, all leaders in Aquatics from across the state of Oregon, were complimentary of the Aquatic Park facility, operations and its staff.
- In preparation for a very busy summer season, the aquatics team successfully hired and trained five new lifeguards (all interested in becoming swim instructors), two water aerobics instructors and one service maintenance team member. Aquatic staff also trained and certified five new Lifeguard Instructor Trainers. These new instructors will increase training opportunities for courses in first aid, CPR and new lifeguarding training.

PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON

- Staff continue to prepare for summer, and are in the process of hiring for summer positions – lifeguards, swim instructors and recreation leaders.
- Staff are choosing dates and preparing content for new hire trainings as summer positions are filled. The aquatic leadership team is working on recertifying the lifeguard team.
- Aquatics is preparing to post and conduct interviews for an additional full-time Shift Coordinator to join their team.
- Staff are preparing for Summer Nights adult softball league (our largest season with 23 teams registered) to start in June. The league will play games on Monday, Thursday, Friday and Sunday evenings from June 5 to August 11.
