Call to Order

DAC meeting was called to order by Chair Stee at 5:32 p.m. A quorum was present.

North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District Advisory Committee BYLAWS

ARTICLE I

NAME. The name of this Committee is the North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District Advisory Committee (DAC)

ARTICLE II

BOUNDARIES. The boundaries of the District shall be the same as those redrawn after the withdrawal of the City of Happy Valley and as depicted in Attachment A and titled NCPRD Boundaries and Advisory Committee Sub-Areas Map and dated October 28, 2020. The Boundaries of subareas 1, 2, 3, 4 and the city of Milwaukie shall be as depicted in Attachment A.

ARTICLE III

PURPOSE. The purpose of the DAC is to advise the Board of Directors of the North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District (NCPRD) on the acquisition, design, planning, and development of parks and recreation facilities within the District, and to advise the Board of Directors on programs, maintenance, and operations; to meet with the Board of Directors once yearly; and to review and provide input prior to the publication of the NCPRD annual report.

GOALS. The goals of the DAC are as follows:

- a) To evaluate and address the programs and facilities of the NCPRD concentrating on the annual work plan that addresses challenges, desires, and needs of all district residents.
- b) To make policy-level recommendations regarding acquisitions, assets, capital improvements, programs, maintenance, and operations to be approved by the Board of Directors.
- c) To provide recommendations during the annual budget process for the acquisition, development, operation and maintenance of the NCPRD facilities and programs. In addition, the DAC will identify and prioritize necessary capital projects and provide project recommendations to the Board of Directors. The recommendations for maintenance and operations, and capital improvements shall be reviewed by the District Budget Officer, who will then forward their recommendations to the North Clackamas Parks & Recreation Budget Committee. The North Clackamas Parks & Recreation Budget Committee will then submit recommendations to the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV

MEMBERSHIP. The DAC shall consist of eleven (11) members. The Board of Directors shall appoint all members. Membership shall not be limited by race, creed, color, gender, age, heritage, religion, national origin, or income. Membership should reflect the economic, social, demographic, and cultural diversity of the entire District. All members must be residents of the District.

- a) The 11-member board representation will be as follows:
 - i) 2 members from the City of Milwaukie;
 - ii) 2 members who are residents of unincorporated sub-area 1 within the District depicted on Attachment A;
 - iii) 2 members who are residents of unincorporated sub-area 2 within the District depicted on Attachment A;
 - iv) 2 members who are residents of unincorporated sub-area 3 within the District depicted on Attachment A;
 - v) 2 members who are residents of unincorporated sub-area 4 within the District depicted on Attachment A; and
 - vi) 1 member from a District community center advisory board(s).
- b) The Board of Directors may appoint one of its members as a non-voting liaison to the DAC.
- c) The composition of the DAC is based on the boundaries and populations depicted in Attachment A, and will be revisited and may be adjusted every four years, or in the event of significant District boundary changes or major population changes, or at the discretion of the DAC.
- d) Terms are for a period of four (4) fiscal years, beginning on July 1st of the first fiscal year and ending on June 30th of the fourth fiscal year. Committee member terms will be staggered among the eleven DAC members. At the end of each initial term, DAC members, other than those appointed under (a)(i) and (vi) above, and who wish to continue their service for a second term, will need to participate in the recruitment process used to fill vacancies and may be reappointed by the Board of Directors. The representatives appointed under subsections (a)(i) (vi) above, may serve a maximum of two consecutive terms. Representatives may reapply for vacancies on the committee following a four (4) year break in service (one full term).
- e) All sub-areas may choose to reappoint their designees, or submit new representatives for Board of Directors' approval. New designees will be recruited and nominated by a sub-area nominating committee located within that particular sub-area, and if no such committee exists at the time of the recruitment, then from a committee composed of 2 members of Clackamas County staff, 2 members of the DAC, and 2 members of Community Planning Organizations or other community groups located within the particular sub-area. All members to be appointed by the Board of Directors.

- f) A vacancy occurs when any member of the DAC dies, resigns, is removed, has more than three (3) unexcused absences from meetings during a fiscal year, or no longer is a resident of the District. Upon failure of any member to attend three consecutive meetings without a valid excused absence, the DAC may recommend termination of that appointment to the Board of Directors, and the Board of Directors may remove the incumbent from the DAC and declare the position vacant. A valid excused absence requires that the DAC member notify a DAC officer or a District staff member prior to the meeting to be missed, except for the case of an emergency. Vacancies are filled in the same manner as initial appointments and for the unexpired term of the vacant position.
- g) All DAC members shall serve without compensation.

ARTICLE V

OFFICERS & STAFFING. The officers and staffing of the DAC shall include the following:

- a) Chairperson. The Chairperson shall preside over all DAC meetings, assist the NCPRD Director with setting the DAC Meeting agendas, and establish committees and appoint committee chairpersons. The Chair will serve as the DAC representative in meetings with the Board of Directors or at various community meetings when appropriate. The Chair will also serve as the official spokesperson for the DAC whenever there is an issue or statement required when it is appropriate for the DAC to make that response or statement.
- b) Vice-Chairperson: The Vice Chairperson shall execute all powers of the Chairperson in the absence of the chairperson;
- c) Secretary: The Secretary shall maintain minutes and attendance records of business meetings. Additionally, the Secretary will initiate the recruitment process to fill vacancies upon term expirations. The Secretary position is neither elected nor appointed but rather filled by NCPRD staff.
- d) Board of Directors Liaison: The Board of Directors may elect to appoint a liaison/liaisons to the DAC in an ex-officio capacity with no voting powers or rights but who has the authority to speak on behalf of the Board of Directors and to participate in discussions about actions under consideration for recommendation to the Board of Directors. The liaison is present as a representative of the Board of Directors and not in their individual capacity.

SELECTION OF OFFICERS. The officers shall be selected by the DAC membership by simple majority vote. Elections shall be annually as the first order of business at the first DAC meeting of the fiscal year in July. The outgoing Chair will conduct the election, and immediately following results, turn the meeting over to the newly elected Chair. The DAC

shall provide the County Public and Government Affairs Department with a current list of officers.

TERM OF OFFICE. The term of office for all officers shall be one (1) year, the officer shall continue to serve until a successor is elected to that office. Officers may be re-elected and may serve a maximum of two consecutive terms.

VACANCIES. A member may be elected as an officer to fill a vacancy and shall serve the remainder of the unexpired term and until a successor is elected.

ARTICLE VI

MEETINGS. The DAC may hold regular meetings monthly. All meetings shall be subject to the requirements of the Oregon Public Meetings Law.

Special meetings may be called by any two DAC Members and an Officer. Only business specified in the agenda for the special meeting may be considered. Notice of all meetings shall be provided as required by ORS 192.640 of the Oregon Public Meetings Law. Minutes of all meetings shall be kept and shall be available for public inspection as required by Oregon Public Meetings Law. A copy of all meeting minutes shall be provided to the County Public and Government Affairs Office.

QUORUM and VOTING. A quorum shall be present at a meeting in order for the DAC to transact business. A quorum consists of six (6) members, which is a majority of all members of the DAC. A vacancy on the DAC does not affect the quorum requirements. The concurrence of a majority of the DAC members present shall be required to decide any matter.

RECORDS. All records of the DAC shall be subject to disclosure except as allowed by exemptions of the Oregon Public Records Law.

ARTICLE VII

HEARING PROCESS AND PROCEDURE. The principles of parliamentary rules of procedures such as Robert's Rules of Order shall govern proceedings at any meeting of the DAC. The Chair shall be guided by these principles in deciding any procedural questions. The Chair's decision on procedural matters may be overruled by a majority of the members voting on the question. The DAC may establish a more detailed hearing process and procedure to provide for an orderly process for holding a public hearing. All meetings shall comply with the Oregon Public Meetings Law.

ARTICLE VIII

COMMITTEES. The DAC may from time to time create committees as required to promote the purposes and objectives of the DAC. A Chairperson for each committee shall be selected by the DAC Chairperson.


ARTICLE IX

AMENDMENTS. These bylaws may be amended at any regular DAC meeting provided written notice of the proposed amendment is submitted at a prior, regular meeting. In order to be effective such amendments must also be approved in writing by County Counsel and further submitted to the Board of Directors for final approval. The DAC may not amend Article IV Membership in any way that differs with the requirements of the IGA between NCPRD and the City of Milwaukie.

The amended bylaws shall supersede all previous bylaws and become the governing rules for the DAC.

NCPRD Monthly Division Report

Prepared for the NCPRD District Advisory Committee (DAC)

REPORTING PERIOD: September-October 2023

DAC MEETING DATE: November 8, 2023

Asset Development

The purpose of the Asset Development program is to coordinate and manage current and long-range planning, the acquisition of park land, all aspects of the District's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), and the repair and replacement of capital assets in order to provide recreation facilities that serve District residents. (Capital repair & replace will be included in Division Report for Parks, Trails and Natural Areas).

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Park at Jennings Lodge Campus: NCPRD hosted the first community event/open house and
online survey to hear from the community on their hopes, wishes and desires for the new
neighborhood park. Approximately 70 participants attended the in-person open house, and we
had a total of 349 responses to the online open house.







- Community Park at Concord: Completed 70% Construction Drawings for the playground.
- Metro Local Share Funding: The IGA between Metro and NCPRD was approved, finalizing the
 commitment to implement the restroom/picnic shelter and aspects of the nature-based play
 area at the Concord Property project and stipulates the conditions under which bond funds will
 be released to NCPRD.



- Oregon Parks and Recreation Local Government Grant: Oregon Parks and Recreation
 Department (OPRD) awarded NCPRD \$500,373 through the Local Government Grant Program
 (LGGP) to help fund the nature-based playground planned for the park at the Concord Property.

 The LGGP is a voter-approved, state lottery funded grant program administered by OPRD.
- Concord Construction: The start of construction has been delayed for the library and community center. The design review application was initially approved by the County in July. That decision was appealed, and we are currently waiting for the Hearings Officer to make a final decision on the appeal. The project cannot obtain any permits until this decision is made. The estimated construction start is now December 1, 2023. The design for the community center is complete and we are working on bidding the project out and putting together a GMP. A groundbreaking celebration gathered community members on September 16, 2023, to celebrate the start of construction.







- System Plan: The contract was signed by the consultant, Design Workshop, reviewed by County legal and procurement and is awaiting approval from the Board of Directors. NCPRD welcomed Shane Seaman as a graduate intern for geographic information systems (GIS) and planning. Shane will be supporting GIS work needed for the System Plan. Interviewed candidates for the community engagement undergraduate intern position, which will support the System Plan work.
- Trails System Plan: Oregon Department of Transportation awarded NCPRD a grant in the amount of \$300,000 to conduct detailed trails planning in 2024 (following up from broader System Plan).



- Trolley Trail Safety Audit: Alta Planning and Design finalized the Safety Audit report. The report
 can be found here: https://ncprd.com/wp-content/uploads/2014/09/FINAL-Trolley-Trail-Safety-Audit-Summary-Report compressed.pdf
- **Staffing:** Successful recruitment of new Principal Planner. Erin Reome started in September and fills the position vacated by Katie Dunham, who moved out of state. Recruitment of a new Planning and Development Director will be completed in November. The new Director fills the position vacated by Heather Koch. NCPRD is grateful for Katie and Heather's great work and time with NCPRD.

CURRENT PROJECTS/TASKS

- Community Park & Center at Concord Property: Finalize construction documents for the play area and for the community center; seek Board approval for Guaranteed Maximum Price amendment for park, site and play area.
- Park at Jennings Lodge Campus: Based on community feedback, develop park concept alternatives for community input. Schedule pre-application conference with the County to discuss land use requirements for the project.
- System Plan: Seek Board approval to finalize contract with Design Workshop and kick off project.

LOOKING AHEAD

- **Concord Property:** Finalize construction documents for play area; seek Board approval for Guaranteed Maximum Price amendment for play area and building.
- System Plan: Begin system inventory and analysis and develop engagement plan.
- Park at Jennings Lodge Campus: Begin developing park concept alternatives after first community event. Continue to engage with the community and plan for a second community event to be held in January 2024, date TBD.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Older Adult Services

The purpose of the Older Adult Services program is to provide coordinated nutritional, transportation, educational and social service programming to the communities' older adults and persons with disabilities; assisting them in remaining independent and helping them thrive in their later years.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

• The Housing & Senior Services fair was held on September 14. This Milwaukie Community Center (MCC) Foundation fundraiser was free to the public and provided different resources to help them navigate the changes that come with aging.



- The front entrance, lobby and hallway were painted during maintenance week. The new color scheme was curated, pro bono, by the designers at ZGF Architecture and the paint was paid for by the MCC Foundation. The result is a much brighter, livelier space. This work continues as new art and furnishings are being evaluated to put the finishing touches on the space. This aligns with one of the MCCAB's major goals of making the MCC feel more inviting to all age groups.
- The MCC Foundation held its annual Mah Jongg tournament on Saturday, October 21. There were 80 participants who each paid \$38 to play. This event is both a fun community event and a fundraiser for the Foundation.

Recreation

The purpose of the NCPRD Recreation program is to provide a variety of recreational and educational opportunities directly and in partnership with other providers to enhance personal health and the quality of life for all residents of the District.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

• NCPRD's second annual Fiesta Latina en el Parque was a great success with 1,181 attendees, a 35% increase from last year's attendance. Attendee surveys were collected during the event and 93.6% were very satisfied with the event and plan to return next year. The event included 10 artisan vendors, 4 food vendors and 2 dessert vendors. Performances included a Peruvian folkloric dance by MB Peru Baila Asi, mariachi music by Mariachi Mexico en la Piel, an Aztec dance by Ollin Yolliztli PDX, a magic show by Stefano laboni with Smile Solution and a banda performance by La Consentida Banda Estrella De Oro.











• Fall recreation classes began on September 25 with 620 participants registered for MCC's fall offerings, including 32 adult classes and 8 youth classes. Total number of participants in fall classes increased by 8% from the previous year. Popular classes include Strength & Relaxation Yoga, Functional Fitness, Sit-N-B-Fit, Zumba, Acrylics and our youth Ballet and Jazz classes.





- New fall classes included Loom Knitting and Introduction to iPhones & iPads.
- Rising Stars Adaptive and Inclusive soccer league wrapped up its inaugural season on Saturday,
 October 14, on the Concord School Property field. The participants, most of whom had never
 had the opportunity to compete in a game before, played under sunny skies all eight
 Saturdays!
- Hoopers Fall basketball clinics, for players in grades 3-8, proved to be very popular as we had a
 waiting list of over 50 players. Clinics for spring are being planned for grades K-8 to meet
 community needs.
- Pre-K Multi-Sport concluded on Wednesday, October 25, at the Campbell Elementary gymnasium. The future stars had a fun introduction to the world of soccer, flag football and basketball.
- Sideout Volleyball (coed program for grades 1-8) began play on September 25 and will wrap up their season on November 18. The program experienced a 23% growth in registrations for the fall 2023 season and an overall 60% growth rate in registrations since its inception in 2014.





• The Adaptive & Inclusive Costume Dance took place at the Milwaukie Community Center on October 28. All had a spooky good time!





- North Clackamas Park Ball field's 2023 season ended on October 29. The fields will reopen for youth baseball and softball in March 2024.
- The Senior Softball League, for players 62 years of age and older, wrapped up another successful season at North Clackamas Park. The seniors will be back on the fields on April 1, 2024.
- Fall Frenzy adult softball league will continue to play on the Adrienne C. Nelson High School fields through November 12.



• Staff attended the Transition Fair on October 7, hosted by Embold Credit Union. The purpose of the fair is to empower individuals with special needs as they journey into adulthood.





- The Aquatic Park's annual maintenance shutdown concluded on September 29. Some of the projects that were completed include:
 - o Installation of two new 4-inch "check valves"
 - Multiple roof leaks were repaired
 - Over 1.25 miles of expansion joint were inspected/repaired or replaced
 - o Almost 2,800 sq. ft. of grout was administered to the pools
 - Over 8 gallons of paint were applied in the facility
 - o 50 tiles and 60 light bulbs were replaced
 - The entire team completed their semi-annual training including practicing a fire evacuation and refreshers on mandatory training



- NCAP hosted its first Sensory Swim in October. Attendees were happy to swim without all of
 the noise and distractions that come with the Big Surf recreational swims. Many of the
 participants stated that they are looking forward to our next swim in November!
- An air curtain was installed in the entry to the Aquatic Park. This will keep the vestibule climate controlled and allow for better heat management in the lobby area.
- October swim lessons began with 366 students gaining water confidence and safety skills!
- Three Recreation staff members attended the National Recreation and Parks Association
 conference held in Dallas. Their return brought a wealth of product and program ideas, as well
 as valuable resources and newfound knowledge. This event also facilitated meaningful
 connections with industry peers and provided an opportunity to reunite with friends from
 across the country.



PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON

- Staff continue coordinating and planning for Winter Celebrations and Lunar New Year, identifying which performers, food and interactive booths will be present.
- Staff are in the planning stages for the My Little Valentine Dance. The last time this event happened was in 2020 and we are excited for its return. Admission includes DJ-provided music, a dessert buffet, a photo opportunity and games.
- "Game On" The Ultimate Teen Game Night! is a FREE event that is being developed for those ages 12-17. Teens will have a fun-filled evening with let's glow karaoke, video gaming, crafts, contests, snacks and more.
- Hoopers basketball has nearly 600 players registered for the program. We expect around 1,600 players to participate when we begin play in January.
- Sports coordinators are recruiting and training staff for the Hoopers and Shooting Stars basketball season.
- Planning for the 2024 North Clackamas Park field schedule is underway.
- Three lifeguards are finishing up their swim instructor academy and should be ready to teach by late fall.
- The Aquatic Park is in the process of repairing/replacing their sump pit pumps. Refurbishing the system will help prevent any flooding in the sump pit.
- We are currently preparing for our most ambitious fall swim team season. This year, we will host five high school team practices and 14 home swim meets. Additionally, we will host three private local youth teams, one local water polo club, one local youth kayak club, two adult kayak clubs and our adult masters swim team.
- Staff are preparing and finalizing Winter and Spring programming for 2024.

North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District Quarterly Financial Report Summary – Quarter 1 July 2022 – September 2023 pre-audit

General Fund – Fund 213

The FY 22-23 audit is in process and the beginning fund balance is expected to come in higher than anticipated. This is due to revenues coming in higher and expenditures coming in lower than anticipated.

The majority of property tax revenue is received between November and January. As of September 30, 2023, we have received 0.4% of budgeted property tax revenue. Other revenues during Q1 include \$308,000 in remaining ARPA funding, Aquatic Park and Sports activities, the Clackamas Elementary lease, and donation and grant revenue for our Nutrition program. Expenditures should be about 25% of budget for Q1 but will fluctuate because of the nature of our programs.

SDC Funds - Fund 281, 282, 283

These are special revenue funds and account for the system development charges on new residential and commercial development in each Zone. Fund resources are transferred to the Capital Projects Fund on a reimbursement basis for construction of specific capital projects within each zone. Revenues include SDCs and interest. A 2% fee for the collection of SDCs is collected and expensed quarterly. A total of \$2,293 was collected and expensed for that fee through Q1.

Revenues include system development charges, grants, and transfers from other funds, which are designated for the construction of specific capital projects and/or capital asset repair and replacement. The beginning fund balance is comprised of remaining property disposition proceeds, balance of the capital repair & replacement account (formerly funded by a transfer from the general fund), and a grant specifically for a project at North Clackamas Park. Revenues through September 30, 2023, include the anticipated beginning fund balance.

OVERVIEW

North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District (NCPRD) and Oregon City School District (OCSD) are working together to design a park for the Jennings Lodge Campus that meets the recreation needs of its youngest students and opens the site to community use. The project team planned the first open house to introduce the project to the community and learn more about people's needs and hopes for a new park. We want to hear from you about what would make this park work best for the community.

Over 450 people were engaged through this first round of outreach. Opportunities for engagement, as well as highlights from the feedback received, are summarized below.

Opportunities for engagement

- Online Open House offered in Spanish and English with a total of 349 responses.
 - 334 in English, 15 in Spanish
 - Available from September 21 October 12, 2023.
- In-person Open House with approximately 70 participants. Spanish interpretation was available.
 - September 28, 2023
- Jennings Lodge CPO summer picnic, staff spoke with approximately 40 people.
 - o August 19, 2023.
- Jennings Lodge school outreach, 7 comment forms and 7 student drawings received.

How engagement opportunities were promoted:

- Postcard sent to all addresses (1,343) within the Jennings Lodge neighborhood area advertising the open houses.
- Social media posts to NCPRD's Facebook page (64,774 Reach) and Instagram account (4,770 reach).
- Posted on the project website (874 views).
- Emails sent to the NCPRD list (9,548 recipients), project list (41) and OCSD mailing lists.
- Flyers promoting the open house were posted at Jennings Lodge school.
- Tabling at the Jennings Lodge CPO summer picnic.

- A-frame signs placed at the school, near the Trolley Trail at Stringfield Park, Risley Park, and Boardman Wetlands Nature Park, promoting the open house.
- Briefing at the District Advisory Committee.

Public Feedback Key Themes

Overall, participants were enthusiastic for a new park that will support child development, community building, and climate resilience for the neighborhood. Some of the key themes recorded are:

- Playing with kids on the playground was the most commonly selected option for how people
 use the park today. Many also like to come to the park to walk, with or without their dogs.
 Enjoying the park for nature and quiet was also added in by many people.
- **Climbing and swinging** landed at the top of the list for play items for the new park design.
- Several people brought up the need for inclusive and accessible play equipment, and park access overall (wheelchair ramps, tables, etc.).
- Covered space was also written in many times, whether for kids playing, eating, or community gathering.
- **Gathering space and a playground** were by far the most commonly selected options for park activities. Write in items include a water feature (66), a dog park (44), and pickelball (23).
- Water features of various sorts were mentioned many times throughout the open houses (63).
- Participants selected restroom and walking paths as the preferred amenities. Accessibility
 was also mentioned again here as a priority.
- A majority of participants attending both in person and online open houses (231 out of 419) selected they would like to have a park with a **natural character**. Comments about nature and natural features came up in various formats throughout this outreach.

Who we heard from

Of the roughly 419 participants in the open houses, 192 or 45% answered at least one of the demographic questions. 83% of participants who provided a response to the race or ethnicity question identified as white. The second largest racial or ethnic identity selected was Latino or Hispanic (7%). Female identifying participants were highly engaged in this round of outreach with 76% of responses indicating female. There was a fairly equal distribution of age ranges participating, with the 35-44 year old group being the largest with 34%. The under 17 group may have been under counted due to this group not completing most written feedback opportunities and therefore not tracked.

Most participants came from Milwaukie and/or the 97267 ZIP code.

What's Next?


The project team will collect all community feedback and existing site conditions to inform the development of draft park designs. We will come back to the public for review of the designs later this year.




How do you access the park today? (480 selections – online and inperson)







Every park is an opportunity to integrate native plants into our communities so we can support our local ecosystems & learn from them in return... a lifelong connection:) I don't remember exactly what play structures my elementary school's playground had, but I'll never forget the beautiful Pacific Dogwood I was allowed to pick 1 flower from every spring, the fascinating alder cones I'd collect from the ground (pretending they were "berries" I was gathering for a pie), the excitement of finding cool bugs & butterflies in the bushes, the delightful sounds the bushes made when I rustled them, the beautiful birds I wanted to paint when I got home, and much more. My hope is that the younger generations get to experience these delights just like I did!

Comments and ideas that were not fully reflected in other portions of this summary:

- (3) Signs in different languages / reference to bilingual programming at the school throughout its history (art or landscaping ideas) / some historical information on the school and neighborhood
- Land acknowledgement sign or artwork
- Signs for no smoking and for behavior
- Toxin Free! A healthy place to provide grounding, a researched phenomena wherein humans can contact the earth.
- There are not sidewalks in the local area near the approach to the current location. Would make pedestrian access much safer.
- Will parks and Rec be coming early each morning to clean the dog poop off of the playground so custodians, teachers and students don't have to deal with it every day? This was a BIG issue when I worked there years back, until we banned dogs from the playground. Even then it was still sort of an issue.
- I grew up in the area. We do NOT need more "lawn" and "play areas". We need to get back to nature and support our neighbors with educational tools on food production (i.e. plant a fruit tree "grove" in the park and a community garden) and learn to LIVE WITH nature rather than "taming" nature. IF you insist on "building a park" you should ONLY use native plants that will

provide food sources for wildlife and humans alike or food producing trees/shrubs for humans. Even the grass can be and should be native grasses. Maybe a small bioswale. Definitely labels on the plant species and educational signs.

- Maintain/improve the existing shelter. It is important to all ages in our community.
- In September 2021, the school was a popular site for watching roosting swifts. Dozens of
 families came out over the course of the month. In September 2022, there were no swifts. The
 obvious reason being that the school district somehow closed off the chimney. Swifts have lost
 most of their traditional hollow tree roosts, and they are great to have for eating mosquitoes (for
 which 2023 was a banner year). People also love watching their nightly display. The school
 district should reopen the chimney.
- (2) When is NCPRD going to finish Milwaukie Bay? Pausing that project to instead focus on this is a huge waste of money and catering to politics at its worst.
- How do you plan to repurpose the existing play structures, equipment? New is not always better.
- 1.75 acre has the potential to sequester 17-1/2 tons of carbon annually if the soil microbiology is not killed with toxic ag chemicals. Grounds maintenance can be done in a way that helps the planet and our neighborhoods. Let's be an example for climate action.
- Plant beautiful trees that other people in the community would want to emulate in their yards thus unifying the community.

Teacher Feedback

The current teachers at Jennings Lodge school were given a customized feedback form to record their comments and ideas. Their selections on the photo questions are recorded above with the rest of the feedback. Their comments are collected here.


- For safety and security purposes teachers would appreciate having clear signs that indicate the
 playground is closed during school hours to prevent conflicts with the public. Closed and locked
 gates, with a push bar from inside but locked from the outside would also help the teachers feel
 more confident.
- Signs should be posted prohibiting dogs from the play area.
- Clear lines of visibility are important for monitoring the full playground.
- Benches and picnic tables would be helpful to give kids a chance to eat outside.
- Shade would also provide expanded play opportunities during the summer, sometimes it gets too hot.
- The covered play area would be improved by simply painting the ground with some activities such as a track or road for scooters and bikes, or lines for group games. A shed to store outdoor supplies would also be useful.
- Lighting could help increase use of the outdoor space and make it safer in the winter.
- Kids like to gather in small groups, play on the swings and balance beam, run in the field, dig, climb and jump, but often get bored with the provided climbing opportunities and look for not so safe options. Having opportunities to play with water and explore nature would increase the educational capacity in the outdoor space.
- Classes use both doors to access the playground, but primarily the north door.

- There are typically 30-50 students using the space at a time with 3-6 teachers. Summer camps can have up to 90 kids. During these times it's important to have spaces that are clearly separated. Also, keeping any active sports and balls separate from the small kids play area is a priority for safety.
- The current play structure isn't appropriate for 3–5-year-old kids, and is in poor condition. A safer and more age-appropriate option would be appreciated.
- Would like the metal monkey bars removed. Kids love the swings and it's a great opportunity for cooperation.
- The climbing dome and balance beam are also favorites.
- The current bark chip surface is undesirable for small kids.




To which gender identity do you most identify? (184 responses)

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


